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Welcome

Spina Bifida Hydrocephalus Scotland (SBH Scotland) provide a lifetime commitment of specialist support and information to all those affected by these lifelong, complex disabilities including family members, carers and healthcare professionals.

Created in 1965 by parents, for parents and their children, over 50 years later we're now a national charity with individuals remaining at the heart of everything we do.

SBH Scotland's Direct Services Support Team work across Scotland to support over 4,000 individuals with a range of services including: a helpline, one-to-one support in homes and schools, combined clinics in hospitals, support groups, financial advice, play sessions, outings and workshops.

All of our services are completely free to members and with little statutory funding we are indebted to grant making bodies, individuals and companies who allow us to support all those who ask for our help. Thank you for your support and for taking the time to find out more about us in this annual report.

Chairperson's Report

Each year brings with it challenges both internally and externally however, thanks to a dedicated staff team nationwide, a committed board of trustees and the continued support of generous individuals and grant making bodies I'm proud to say that this year we have still been able to increase our level of service delivery. Thanks, in part, to a generous legacy receipt the overall income generation has also been extremely positive against budget.

We remain the only charity in Scotland dedicated to supporting spina bifida and/or hydrocephalus. As these conditions are classed as rare, with around one in every thousand pregnancies affected, they are often overlooked and therefore the provision of national health services for our members are incredibly limited. However,

the demands which each disability brings and the pressures they can put on the individual, parents and carers are very real. That is why SBH Scotland's range of services are a vital lifeline for so many and why they remain as relevant as ever.

Responding to the needs of our members is as important as ever but against a backdrop of over 20,000 registered charities in Scotland alone, the search for funding remains as difficult as ever. A big challenge for us remains time-limited funding where successful projects are launched, becoming an important part of people's lives. At the end of the funding term SBH Scotland then has to make some serious. decisions about the ability to continue funding them. Over the past twelve months we have therefore made a concentrated

effort to focus our investigations on sustainability in a bid to ensure the integration of time-limited projects into core services where it is necessary. Over the next few years we hope to see those plans come into action.

Our report this year gives us the opportunity to reflect on many of the positive outcomes achieved through our extensive work and I would personally like to thank all those who have, and continue to, make those achievements possible.

Stronger Links: Stronger Families

Looking forward to another successful chapter

In February SBH Scotland were delighted to announce that we had secured funding from the Big Lottery Fund Scotland to continue our 'Stronger Links: Stronger Families' project for the next 3 years.

This important project, covering Edinburgh, Lothian, Borders and Fife has made great strides in supporting families with children aged 0-9 since 2014 and the continued funding means we can do even more, growing the project to increase the support to children up to the age of 14 as well as covering Tayside.

Chief Executive Summary

Achievements

- We continue to focus significant resource in encouraging all of our children to have the best chance in life through targeted early years and learning support. One specific area is that of bridging the attainment gap thanks to our 'Have A Go' project supported by Scottish Government through a CYPFEIF and ALEC Fund Grant.
- Direct Services within Scotland have continued to increase with a more focused delivery within three regional teams. This has allowed more flexibility to respond to emerging regional variations in levels of demand and style of support.
- National coverage remains constant for services including the Helpline, Clinical Support and Financial Support Services.
- The organisation continues to be represented on national and international groups who have a particular interest in spina bifida, hydrocephalus and related conditions and to enable service user's voices to be heard in policy matters and service delivery.

plan to launch an app called
'MyCarePod' for SBH Scotland
members. The app offers the
opportunity for members to access
their own health and social care
records on our electronic portal, diarise
appointments and store important

health and wellbeing information.

Positive Partnerships

Spina Bifida Hydrocephalus Scotland (SBH Scotland) work with all nursery or educational institutions that require our help.

With so many children in every class, teacher and learning support assistants often have a mammoth task in nurturing

the abilities of all the

young people, especially when some of those have additional support needs.

As well as going in to schools and nurseries to provide talks

for staff, SBH Scotland have spent this year growing the number of resources which are available to them. One of those resources involved working in partnership with teachers and students at Dalespark Primary in Peterhead, a school which

has an exceptional approach in working for the inclusion of those with additional support needs.

Together, we produced an

educational film called

'Getting it right for me: Achieving, Included, Respected' that offers insight into stategies which have worked well

for our members.

The film follows Andrew who was born with spina bifida and hydrocephalus and has overcome many barriers during his life including the adjustment to becoming a permanent wheelchair user after sudden complications prevented him walking.

This film, along with existing SBH Scotland resources such as our Hydrocephalus and Learning booklet, will be promoted by the charity's support workers to schools across Scotland and will serve as a model of how these complex disabilities can be approached by those working in an education setting to help all children reach their full potential.

Our partnership working with Dalespark Primary saw it crowned winner of the 'Education Partnership' Award at the Scottish Power Foundation Awards in November 2017.

Every year we budget annual unrestricted income based on the performance of previous years, knowledge of pending applications and service developments. Income from over 30 income streams are budgeted including trusts and foundations, special appeals, community fundraising, sponsored activities, corporate partnerships and social/corporate events. With a limited marketing budget the majority of the charity's fundraising successes were achieved via an increased use of digital opportunities, networking and personal approaches.

We made the decision to continue enhancing our use of digital from the previous year to drive online sales, promote events and most recently reduce costs from third party suppliers by the creation of our own in-house, online registration and payment system. This enhancement has not only streamlined our administration process but has also increased sponsored activity income by 22.17% in this financial year.

Similarly in events, through a combination of corporate networking, relationship building, press and digital promotions

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this year's Question of Burns saw an additional 125 people in attendance and an increase of 41.96% in income generation.

Additional income was also generated by the team via applications for Restricted Projects which would deliver time limited specialist services that would complement our core Family Support Services. We are also grateful to the Scottish Government for a welcome contribution of £160k to support our core activities.

Thank you to every person who

donated, attended an event, volunteered, sat on a fundraising committee, undertook a challenge or generously provided a grant to SBH Scotland in 2017/18. We still need to raise over £1million each year and we can't do it alone.

Together we can make a real change for the better in Scotland – Thank you!

Meet the Super SquadForging Friendships

SBH Scotland groups and playschemes are a great way for children to make new and lasting friendships. Whether it's through musical, creative or sensory play,

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friendships for children can be forged for life in seconds. Our groups also offer the

> opportunity for parents and carers to meet and build up a permanent network of

vital support both inside and outside of the charity.

Every child is unique with individual abilities and personalities but they may not always know how to communicate their needs or emotions. To help with this we created the Super Squad to introduce some of the conditions which children attending our groups have in the hope that children will relate and talk further about themselves to parents, siblings and new friends.



Thanks to funding from Children's Aid Scotland we were able to bring the Super Squad to life through a colourful, illustrated booklet.

The booklet features a variety of children each talking about a different aspect of their condition, be it spina bifida, epilepsy or hydrocephalus and we even meet one of the siblings to hear why he enjoys attending with his sister.

Suitable to read in our groups or take home as an activity this exciting booklet gives our children the opportunity to reflect on their

own conditions, their similarities to others and focus on their own likes and dislikes.

We're proud to be able to provide a different range of support groups in different areas of Scotland. Ranging from Family Groups in Aberdeen and Glasgow to coffee catch ups and project outings across Edinburgh and Lothian. Groups are also available for all ages and our central belt youth group and adult social groups also continue to go from strength to strength.



Health Check Clinics

When our members turn 16
they move from paediatric
healthcare into the adult
healthcare system. The reality
of this is that there are no
more regular reviews with NHS
consultants and doctors and the
only time contacts are made
with healthcare professionals is
usually when conditions have
reached crisis point. From August,
thanks to the recruitment of
a new Nurse Specialist, SBH
Scotland has launched monthly

'Health and Wellness' clinics for all adults with spina bifida and/ or hydrocephalus. The aim of the health checks is to support our members in developing a wide range of self-management strategies, encouraging them to be more proactive about their own conditions, treatments and care. Potential problems can often be picked up and dealt with to prevent more serious health problems developing.

The clinics are confidential and are carried out in a fully equipped treatment room at our centre, The Dan Young Building, in Cumbernauld. For those who can't make it to our centre, phone or webcam (through NHS Attend Anywhere) consultations (pictured) are also offered, making it an accessible option for those who live in remote and rural areas.

Many adults who are living with a long-term health condition can feel isolated or low in mood and are disinclined to go out or be involved in any social activities. Therefore, a further part of the clinic focuses on mental health and emotional wellbeing where we talk to members about how they're feeling so we can offer additional support and guidance.
