
Harry was born with a hole in his back. He faces a lifetime of operations, complex daily procedures and uncertainty.

At Spina Bifida Hydrocephalus Scotland

(SBH Scotland) we're adding quality to life, everyday. We are the only registered charity with a Scotland wide remit to support children, young people and adults with spina bifida and/or hydrocephalus and allied conditions. Right now there are over 3,500 children, young people and adults in Scotland affected by these disabilities and without our Family Support Services, our Support Centre and Lo-Call Helpline many people would not have access to the help they need. Every year our Support Workers handle over 2500 enquiries and make over 250 home and hospital visits.

It costs nearly £1 million every year to maintain our high level of services and we rely almost entirely on fundraising challenges, events, donations and the goodwill of volunteers to raise these much needed funds. SBH SCOTLAND has to raise over £100 an hour to continue giving essential support which includes home and hospital visits, information and training

days, social and leisure groups, respite care, intensive support to all families with a newborn baby, conferences, subsidised holidays and our Lo-Call Helpline.
